Word Garden - Primary School Activity



Objective

To help pupils recognise and celebrate the positive impact of words by creating a collective "garden" display filled with inspiring, connecting, supportive, and empowering words.

Words can grow like seeds. If we plant kind, supportive, inspiring words, we create a beautiful 'garden' that helps everyone feel safe, happy and confident.

Time

15-20 minutes + reflection time

Age Group

KS1/KS2

Instructions

Making the Flowers (15-20 mins)

Materials:

- Pre-printed flower templates (included in the pack 2 or 3 designs: daisy, tulip, sunflower).
- Coloured card/paper (optional).
- Scissors, colouring pencils, felt tips, glue sticks.
- Green paper strips or lollipop sticks for stems



Instructions:

- 1. Give each child one flower template (see blow).
- 2. In the centre circle of the flower, pupils write one word or short phrase that makes them feel good, inspired, or supported.
 - Examples: hope, you can do it, smile, be brave, you belong.

- 3. Pupils decorate their flower petals with colours and patterns.
- 4. Attach the flower to a stem (strip of green paper or a stick).

(For KS1, staff may scribe the word if needed. For KS2, encourage more independence and creativity.)

Creating the Garden Display

- Choose a display board, corridor wall, or hall space.
- Backing paper idea: blue sky and green grass background.
- Arrange flowers together to form a large, colourful "Word Garden."
- Add a heading: "Our Word Garden The Power of Words".

Reflection

- Gather pupils around the display.
- Ask:
 - "How do our words help others grow?"
 - "What does our garden show about our school?"
- Reinforce: "When we choose positive words, we make our community stronger."

Extension / Differentiation Ideas

- Reception/KS1: Use ready-coloured flowers, just write one simple word.
- KS2: Pupils can write a short phrase or quote, e.g., "Be yourself you are enough."
- Whole-school: Each class could grow their own "mini-garden" and combine them in the hall.
